

WHEREAS, the City's Mission Statement is "the City of Costa Mesa serves our residents, businesses, and visitors while promoting a safe, inclusive, and

WHEREAS, the history of Costa Mesa includes early pioneers of Asian ancestry, who contributed to the success of agricultural enterprises that significantly fueled economic growth, adding to the variety of crops and innovative production techniques, prompting the Santa Ana Register to promote in 1928 the 150 acres of strawberries farmed year-round in Costa Mesa by the Japanese American community in the Fairview Avenue district; and

WHEREAS, the Issei, first generation Japanese Americans, contributed to Costa Mesa's community education, founding one of Orange County's early 20th Century Japanese Language Schools at 18th and Whittier streets, supported by the Kuriharas, Hashimotos, Ezakis, Minatos, and Shuji Kanno, father of Fountain Valley's first mayor James Kanno—one of the first Nisei to become mayor in the mainland United States—and an elder with one of the oldest Japanese missions

in California, the Wintersburg Japanese Mission at Orange County's National Treasure historic place, Historic Wintersburg; and

WHEREAS, Asian Americans such as Isamo Noguchi—confined during World War II at the Colorado River Relocation Center in Arizona—made significant contributions to the City of the Arts with the internationally recognized California Scenario sculpture garden in Costa Mesa's theater district; and

WHEREAS, in 1986, the United States and Marshall Islands formed an official diplomatic relationship recognizing the Marshallese right to live, work, and travel in the United States and many Marshallese came to the U.S. and made Costa Mesa their home, and

WHEREAS, the Asian American Pacific Islander community continues to make significant contributions to the fabric of Costa Mesa in the arts, education, cuisine, and our City's cultural landscape, bringing international business and tourism to our community; and

WHEREAS, as our history has shown, times of great fear, uncertainty and unrest can lead to the demonization, blaming, and scapegoating of groups as the other, leading to unjust actions such as World War II incarceration of Costa Mesa's early Japanese pioneers, destruction of property, physical violence, and fear, preventing full participation in civic life; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that I, Katrina Foley, Mayor of the City of Costa Mesa, do hereby proclaim the City of Costa Mesa affirms its commitment to the safety and well-being of all community members, including the Asian American Pacific Islander communities, and in combatting hate crimes targeting Asian American Pacific Islander communities, and ask residents to join us in calling attention to these harms and condemning hate to help keep us all safe during this unprecedented pandemic and beyond.
